Green Schools

Coláiste Bhríde was successfully presented with its seventh green flag "*Global Citizenship - Energy*" on the 23rd May, in the Helix in Dublin, after two years of commitment and hard work from our dedicated Green Schools committee. Their enthusiasm and encouragement of whole school participation contributed to our recent success. In October 2016, Caoimhe Coady was successfully selected as a Green-Schools Ambassador for Coláiste Bhríde for the water theme. Her application was selected from a large number of applicants throughout Ireland. This was a huge achievement and has benefited our school greatly. In September, the Green Schools committee will begin the quest for its eighth flag '*Global Citizenship - Marine Environment'*. As with the previous Global Citizenship themes this is a maintenance theme



that will enable students to discover how their work on the Green Schools programme has positively influenced environments worldwide while focusing their work on our seas and oceans. The Green Schools committee is very enthusiastic and excited about this interesting theme and would be delighted to welcome new members onto our team in September.



Ambassador School Award

We endeavoured, persevered and committed to developing programme а comprehensive positive mental health in Coláiste Bhríde. Our initiatives included 'Rise and Shine' walk, attendance at the Students Congress in UL and the Zeminar in the RDS, facilitating a host of speakers on promoting positive well being including Fionnbar Walsh from the Donal Walsh Foundation. We look forward to accepting our award in Kilmainham in September, working with the Cycle Against Suicide and continuing in our quest to encourage students with promotion of their own well being. 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Waterspout Fundraiser

n February, Professor Kevin McGuigan from The Royal College of Surgeons gave a presentation to all 1st years about a solar disinfection of drinking water system in Uganda called SODIS. This is where African students bring their water to school (often unclean) and it is left in the sun to kill harmful bacteria and make it safe to drink. These students may have travelled up to 10km to get this water before school. The organisation looks to build water tanks in primary schools that can collect the rain water and make it safe to drink for the students. Each student is given two water bottles, one for school and one for home. A tank for a school costs in the region of €800. This talk inspired our first year students to take action and fundraise. All six classes held a bake sale each and 1 Beech gave a shortened version of Professor McGuigan's talk to every class in the school. To raise awareness, they also asked students to walk through the courtyard carrying water drums. The school has joined forces with the parish of Carnew and two primary schools to combine our fundraising efforts. So far €1600 has been raised which will mean we are able to help out two primary schools in Uganda. This is a wonderful achievement.

Young Social Innovators

his years YSI class was incredibly busy promoting their very current project "Homeless not Hopeless". Activities included developing class plans and informing Junior Cycle students and students from



Carnew national school on the whole topic of Homelessness. They knitted scarves to represent the number of homeless people in Ireland and distributed them to those who needed them. Local businesses were contacted to join the Food Cloud initiative whereby food that is not sold is collected and distributed to the homeless. Projects included a fun run organised for junior students and an ice cream sale where money raised will be given to the Peter McVerry Trust. Students received excellent feed back at their Speak Out in Kilkenny and have worked passionately to highlight what they believe is a huge social issue in Ireland today.

Green Schools

The Green Schools committee have worked very hard over the past two years on their seventh green flag "Global Citizenship - Energy". In March of this year the Green Schools committee organised an energy saving week packed with daily activities for the whole school to get involved in. They ran a competition to guess how many LED bulbs fitted in a jar which resulted in over three hundred guesses from the students and staff. The whole school participated in a "no energy class" with no lights, projectors, iPads or computers, to highlight our reliance on electricity. A 1st year Science class planted a crab apple tree at the front of our school as part of National Tree Week. Green School committee members went around to 1st and 2nd year classes to talk about energy saving, climate change and global citizenship. As part of the Green Schools Ambassador Programme, on the 13th February, Prof Kevin McGuigan from Waterspout came to speak to all first year students, the green schools committee and the development education team. He spoke about using solar energy to purify water in African communities. His team is working with Primary schools to harvest rainwater into purpose built tanks for drinking. He showed the horrors associated with unclean water in terms of ill-health. He explained of his endeavours to provide clean water to the Ugandan community and how himself and his team were aiming

and carrying out establishing a clean water system and educating people about the system, it's importance and maintenance. The hard work and dedication of the Green Schools committee along with the participation and involvement of the staff and students in the school resulted in Coláiste Bhríde recently being awarded their seventh green flag in the Helix in Dublin. This is a huge achievement for our school and the committee are looking forward to starting their eighth green flag theme Global Citizenship - Marine Environment.



CB YOUNG SCIENTIST



Oláiste Bhríde Carnew hosted its seventh annual Young Scientist Competition with forty four projects from Transition Year pupils competing on the 13th March 2017. This competition offers a platform for pupils to present their scientific findings on a project that they have chosen and developed independently. It encourages students to explore an idea, investigate it, develop a project and write a report to support their findings. The two judges, Siobhán Fitzgerald and Erin Murphy were amazed at how the standard of projects continues to outshine previous years. The coveted title of OVERALL WINNER was awarded to Adam Haves, Conor Dolan, Maeve Lyons and Gavin Goodwin for their project titled "Piezoelectric Floortiles - Kinetic Energy will power our school". Each class group that competed had a winner with 1st place being awarded to Rebecca Griffin for "Lexic Text", Orla Kealy, Sarah Mulhall and Dervla Donlon for their project "Are young people spending more time in the virtual world than the real world?", Katie Butler and Rebecca O Toole for their project "The effect of Music on Memory", Fiona Boland and Roisin Byrne for their project investigating "The influence media can have over public perception of GMO's" and finally Ciara and Aoife Breen for their project

"To investigate how the gender of same sex twins affects the similarity of their likes and dislikes" This year saw our examiners add a new category for the best display which was awarded to Lisa Lancaster, Cliath Rawson and Sarah O Neill for their project titled *"The effects of refined sugar versus natural sugar while exercising".*

SciFest 2017

CciFest 2017 took place in Carlow I.T., where Jseventy-five projects from the Carlow, Kilkenny, Wexford and Wicklow area competed. Coláiste Bhríde was represented by nineteen students from Transition Year and 5th year with an impressive eight projects ranging from nutrition, renewable energy, health and other social and life sciences. Students were interviewed by judges who were lecturers of Carlow I.T. and working in the industry. Coláiste Bhríde won prizes for no less than four out of eight of their projects and taking home four out of the eleven awards on offer. The Boston Scientific Technology Medical Devices Award went to Fintan Smith and David Kemple for their project looking at how music can effect academic performance. They also qualified for the SFI Intel ISEF award next year. The Best Communicator award sponsored by NewsTalk, went to Rebecca Griffith for her project on Dyslexia called 'Lexic Text'. The Sustainable Energy award sponsored by S.E.A.I. went to Adam Hayes, Conor Dolan, Maeve Lyons and Gavin Goodwin for their project on harnessing kinetic energy using piezoelectric crystals to power the school. Highly commended award went to Cathal Doyle and Emily Harper for their project looking at the effects of blue light from mobile phones on quality of sleep.

Our students confidently and professionally gave a fifteen minuite presentation about their enterprise to judges, teachers, students and members of Gorey Chamber of Commerce.

TY NEWS

Our Transition Year Programme is going from strength to strength since its inception in 2001 with one hundred and seven students having completed the programme this year. We have a multitude of modules and extra-curricular activities which ensures a diversity of experiences for our students.



Driving Instruction

We had three separate trips to the Leinster Driving Campus this year in Maynooth. Approximately sixty of our Transition Year students took part. This is part of our Road Safety Module. Students got hands on driving instruction and completed a practice Driving Theory test on the day.

Glasnevin

All T.Y. students participated in this E.S.S. trip. Glasnevin offered a unique opportunity to bring the story of some of the most important figures in Irish History to life. They visited the graves of Michael Collins, Eamon de Valera, Daniel O'Connell, Charles Stuart Parnell and Arthur Griffith to name but a few. They also participated in a 1916 walking tour of Dublin where they focused on the key events and locations of the 1916 rising.

Work Experience

The opportunity of a young person to engage in a particular career that they hope to pursue after their third level studies is an opportunity to see first hand how the world of work operates. February 13-17th, one hundred and seven innovative, enterprising and ambitious T.Y. students undertook work placements that reflect their career aspirations. Our students scaled many heights on their work experience placements. They audited accounts, witnessed a murder trial, taught the young, listened and cared for the needy, wrote computer programmes, designed houses, concocted medicines, assisted vets, engineered the future, beautified the vain to name but a few. Many students also availed of doing additional work experience over the mid term break.

FOREIGN EXCHANGE & TOURS

French Exchange 2016/2017



This year marks the fifth anniversary of our French Exchange partnership with the Lycée Victor Hugo in Château-Gontier in the west of France. This year we continue our second year of hosting French students for a 3-week period. This opportunity increases the level of immersion in the studied culture and language and affords students a taste of authentic life as a student in school and in a home. The return trip sends our students to France for three to four weeks during their Transition Year, thereby helping them to build a solid platform for their Leaving Certificate French course.



Der Deutsch Irische Schulaustausch 2017

The Irish/German Exchange Programme between Coláiste Bhríde and the KGS (Kooperative Gesamtschule Sehnde) continued in February 2017 with a return visit by our school.

Students from Coláiste Bhríde once again experienced German hospitality first hand whilst staying with their German families. They had the opportunity to experience German culture and food, as well as the chance to finally practice their German in the authentic setting which the host families offer.

The week's activities were organised by our host teachers prior to our arrival. Trips to Hamburg and Wolfsburg were highlights of the week, as the students were treated to a visit to the newly built Opera House in Hamburg which cost a staggering €800 million to build. This state of the art facility on the banks of the



Elbe river was our first port of call before the students were brought to the Hamburger Dungeon. The "Dungeon experience" was created to present the (at times gruesome!) history of the city in a fun and interactive way. Students were most impressed by the Volkswagen factory in Wolfsburg, where the legendary German engineering and efficiency was in full view. Despite photographs being "verboten" there were many covertly taken as the viewing train wound its way around the various stations where robots put the finishing touches to the latest Volkswagen models. When not on trips described above, our students shadowed their partners in school and took part in classes where appropriate. Exposure to a foreign school system certainly offered another perspective to Coláiste Bhríde students and many were surprised at the lack of technology in the classroom. As the week progressed it was obvious that the young people in our charge were becoming very



comfortable with their new surroundings, making new friends and most importantly learning more about the language they are studying in school. The weekend was spent with their host families. Some students were brought on day trips to local attractions and many of them met up for a farewell get together before the final farewell on Sunday morning. As the coach pulled out of Sehnde and families waved " Auf Wiedersehen", it was clear that our ties with Sehnde and the KGS continue to strengthen and, as the years pass, ensure that Coláiste Bhríde students of German will continue to benefit in the future.
